Dear Overleigh Family,

As ever, a busy few weeks with lots of educational visits, visitors to school and continued excellent learning in classes. Thank you to all the staff who have arranged and supported special events and information sharing. Children in Need was great fun and we raised an excellent sum of money to donate, thank you very much to all!

It was super to have snow early in the week and we made sure everyone got to go and play in it before it disappeared. I am sure it won't be the last this year so a couple of things to remember please:

- We will always do absolutely everything possible to remain open. The only thing that restricts
 this is getting our staff in, many of whom come from more remote areas. However, even then, it
 would be <u>exceptional</u> for us to close. PLEASE DO NOT BLOCK OUR PHONE LINES BY ASKING IF WE
 ARE OPEN. If we were not we would send info by Sco Pay and announce on the webpage. Our
 staff will be helping to clear paths etc for safer entry to school.
- Snow is only a reason for children to stay home if parents cannot physically get them to school through the snow—this would only be children living in more remote areas—not Lache, Saltney, Wrexham or Handbridge. Unless the child is too unwell for school, they should attend as usual and could be given unauthorised mark if we believe they are taking a duvet day. It is really important that school adults and parents set a good example to children and help them learn about commitment, expectation and resilience in the face of adversity to support them in their lives as they grow and move into the workplace themselves.
- If children have wellies in school for Forest Schools we will ensure they have these for snowy / very wet days. If they do not have wellies in school, do please ensure your child brings a change of footwear so they can enjoy the fun outside with their classmates.

Snow days are often some of the longest lasting memories for children. We had great fun today. Well done to everyone for exemplary behaviour enjoying snowball fights and snowman/people making. A group of Y6 children made the great snowman in the picture below. They improvised with an old football as a hat—Ziggy pinched it twice before we captured this!





CHRISTMAS

Previously, we have made Christmas cards to sell with the children but have rested this idea, as card sending has become less popular in the spirit of being eco friendly and the expense. We have also sold T-towels previously but we felt it is probably a bit soon to revive this again.

Therefore, this year, every child will make a Christmas Bauble that features a photo of themselves and is seasonally decorated. This can be kept at home or given as a gift to wider family. All children will bring their bauble home. However, we are asking families to make a small donation if they would like, in recognition of the art work. The donations will all go towards funding the Christmas children's Jack & the Beanstalk panto. The cost of resources etc. will be covered by school.



CHRISTMAS HAMPERS

We are putting together 30 hampers for members of our school community in need of a little extra help over the xmas break. Rotary Club are providing coffee & chocolate. St Mary's church are do-

nating tea bags and biscuits. School staff are providing tins of soup. There is absolutely no obligation to participate but I am regularly asked at this time of year by parents and community groups who would like to help out / make a difference. Therefore we thought it would be a good way of making a big difference collectively.

CHRISTMAS PERFORMANCES YR, Y1 & Y2—The performance this year is altogether and repeated 3 times—see dates on next page. In the first instance, we offer 2 spaces per child that families can choose to use together or split at two different shows. WE WILL HAVE ADDITIONAL ROOM. However, to start with we need you to tell us when you want to come so we can keep an eye on numbers for fire regulations. If you let us know who you wish to have additional tickets for and to which performance we will then try and accommodate. If you don't ask us for your 2 spaces we have to assume you are not coming so do please message the office asap so we don't give your spaces away.

CHESHIRE DIOCESE ACADEMY TRUST (CDAT)

We are still waiting but it could well be 1st February before we convert. It is certain now that for us to convert the Diocese need to take ownership of the road outside of school. If this is agreed then it seems bollards will be placed from our school electronic gate and thus block off access for cars to the road. This will mean there will be no drop off immediately outside school and eventually the area will be put over to grass. Pedestrian and cycle access will be maintained. The issues behind this proposal are us not being able to afford to maintain the road from an Education budget and therefore the road would have to be closed. Negotiations continue and when we know more we will let you know.

However, in the mean time we ask all families to use the drop off facility in the College next door rather than immediately outside school unless absolutely necessary. E.g. we have families who have to organise a child to get to special school and can sometimes have to wait for transport so have to drive to us. Even if the road closes we would organise access for these families. However, at the moment the vast majority of people using the drop off are the same families every day and arrive at the last moment causing chaos and not supporting their children to be in the playground for 8.30am ready for doors to open. Please be considerate of others and not just your own convenience.



Rev Antony Dutton was inducted as the new incumbent at St Mary's Church on Monday evening. It was a wonderful celebration and warm reception for Rev Antony and his family. Ruby in Y6 was in choir at the service but also took one of the lead parts in the presentation and welcome from the congregation. She carried out her role perfectly and was very much a credit to her family and school. Rev Anthony will be visiting us at school next week so he can start to get to know the chil-

dren and become part of our school family too. We are very much looking forward to welcoming and working with him in the year ahead.

We are especially looking for donations of Christmas jumpers or anything sparkly ahead of the festive season.










Chester Cathedral Choir Recruiting
